On behalf of the Board of Directors, I would like to extend once again our sincere thanks to our Executive Director, Lori Van Ee and acknowledge the excellent work, expertise and focus that she and her team of dedicated staff bring to the shelter each and every day. I also wish to acknowledge the excellent and competent support Lori receives from the Executive Assistant, Lisa Dupuis.

The Board continues to be proud and fully supportive of the excellent and creative work and contributions made by the entire PCWESA organization to help women and children fleeing violence be safe in their homes and in our communities. The impact of the opioid crisis continues to provide challenges for both clients and the staff who care for them.

Our administration and staff continued to focus on the development of their skills and services to maintain a productive and healthy learning environment. Although because of Covid-19 there were again fewer opportunities to participate in external workshops, administration took full advantage of engaging staff in virtual learning.

The PCWESA had a challenging year maintaining a full complement of staff. Years of stagnant funding, combined with soaring inflation, have left shelters in a precarious situation, with staff burning out and turnover running high. Women's Shelters have also been placed in the position of being a training ground for entry level graduates in social work and other humanities. It is understandable that front line staff who have received training at our shelter as well as at shelters across the province are then attracted to government positions that they have become qualified for where they can earn almost twice the salaries that the government allots for wages at the shelters. The Board fully supports the work and lobbying of the provincial Alberta Council of Women's Shelters in their efforts to address this inequity.

The work of the Board of Directors this year was stable. On May 27, 2023, the Board with input from staff, engaged in generating a new 3-year Strategic Plan which we will continue to finalize over the summer. Focus over the next year will be a review of our mission and mandate, board development and updating our Board Policies and Procedures.

Over the past year, our board membership has been stable with 6 members to whom we are very thankful for their commitment and guidance. For the 2023 -2024 year, Maritza Stinson and Sarah Nodge will be entering the second year of their 2-year terms. Board members Bonita Bourlon and Clara Yagos will be standing for re-election to new 2-year terms. Joe Brown who has leant his expertise to the PCWESA board for the last 13 years and an earlier stint that brings to almost 20 years of support will be stepping down but will remain as an ad hoc advisory member. I cannot thank Joe enough for his many years of contribution and service. Nicole Buret became an interim board member during the past year and stands for election at this AGM.



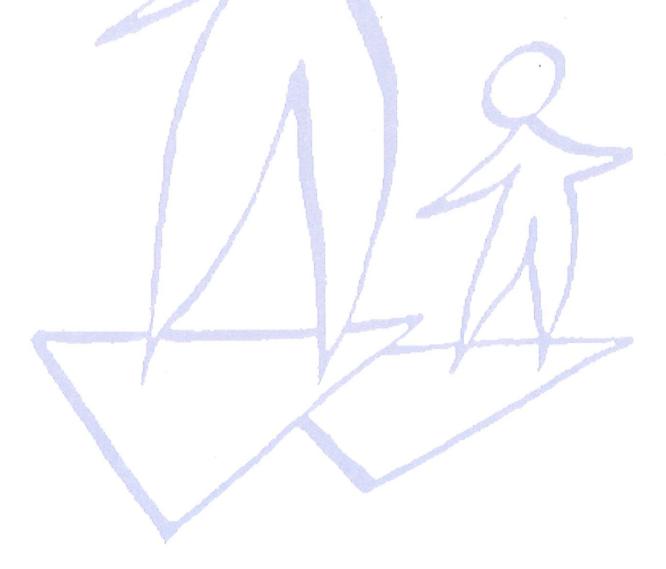

Welcome to all PCWESA members, Board of Directors, staff, and community members.

During this fiscal year we served 68 women and 52 children in the residential program As an organization challenges this year have been continuing to maintain stability post pandemic and supporting women to provide effective programming who are struggling with addictions and mental health issues. Another challenge that we are facing is having women stay longer than the 21 days in shelter due to the issue of affordable housing not being available. Staffing is another challenge that we had to face. Most of our staff come to us at entry-level positions without having the proper training and education to work with the complexities of the clients that we serve. Most of our staffing issues also come at a cost to us as we are unable to retain our staff. Once they are trained, they tend to find higher paying employment with other government agencies or AHS.

I would like to thank all the staff that have managed through the past year to help make the shelter safe for everyone. You have all done such an amazing job with the clients, your colleagues, and your willingness to step up and take on extra shifts throughout the year when we needed you the most. You are all an amazing group of women, and I am grateful for all of you.

It seems that since the COIVD-19 pandemic most professional development opportunities are now completed virtually. The most significant trainings throughout the past year have been the Leading Change Facilitator Activation Training on Gender-Based Violence Prevention through ACWS, The Healing Brain: Supporting Children from Trauma to Resilience through ACWS, Lateral Violence: Working Towards Solutions through the Crisis and Trauma Institute, First Responders to Sexual Assault and Abuse Training through the Association of Alberta Sexual Assault Centres, Compassion Fatigue and PTSD in Social Work through Caring safely, and our Staff Retreat in March where we focused on seven different topics of self care.

I would like to thank the PCWESA Board of Directors for their commitment and support to the organization and the community. I would also like to thank the Government of Alberta for our core funding and the extra supports and encouragement provided through these past few months, and to the Alberta Council of Women's Shelters for their support and advocating for women's shelters. I would also like to thank Women's Shelters Canada for grant received for the 2022/2023 fiscal year to assist with recovering from the COVID-19 pandemic.

I would also like to acknowledge the community of Pincher Creek, as well as the surrounding communities for their generous donations and expressions of appreciation for our organization over the past year.

Hello everyone. My name is Lisa Dupuis, and I have been with the Pincher Creek Women's Emergency Shelter since September of 2015.

Throughout the year we require funds to cover budgetary items that the Ministry, our main funder, does not fund. This year we were extremely fortunate to receive unsolicited individual and business cash donations of \$13,312.62. This amount included individual donations from long time donors Boyd and Roberta Robinson for \$500.00, Esther Neufeld for \$1000.00 and Virginia Grinevitch for \$1000.00. Personal donations from Samantha Myhr for \$500.00. As well as business donations from Unifor, Local 4050 for \$500.00, Father Lacombe Council #2674 for \$500.00, Lundbreck Tire and Lube for \$500.00, the Associate Clinic for \$500.00, the United Church Women for \$500.00 and Canada Helps.org for \$807.36. We also partnered up with the Empress Theatre in Fort Macleod and hosted a successful popcorn fundraiser to close out the month.

We would also like to thank the Community members and Businesses who contribute food, household items, personal care items and toys throughout the year. KJ Cameron Services who continue to collect and sort bottles from individuals that donate to our cause on an ongoing basis. Rocky Mountain Bobcat Services who clear our parking lot and Cal Olson and family that clear our sidewalks during the winter months. There are many more individuals and businesses that help us. We are truly fortunate to live and work in such a caring community.

Hello, and good evening. For the new faces that don't know me my name is Laressa McGlynn, and I am the Outreach Team Supervisor. I would like to introduce our Outreach team, Julie Bastien and Mandy Querengesser. The purpose of the Outreach Program is to provide support for women and children who are survivors of domestic violence. The Outreach program provides education, transportation to medical appointments, referrals, emotional support, basic counselling, and advocacy for clients. The Outreach program meets clients where they are within their lives and assists in empowering positive change within their lives. The program runs for a duration of six months, however, has the potential to be extended depending on the needs of the client. The program recognizes the complex needs that individuals who are experiencing domestic violence are faced with and strives for self-empowerment.

The Outreach team has contributed hard work and dedication to the organization over the past year. The team has shown an ongoing commitment to PCWESA and the services that are offered have strived to keep all people within Southern Alberta safe. The Outreach team has seen an increase in the number of families and children that are served and has been able to accommodate an increase in caseloads amongst us while still managing to support the residential program. Our stats identified from the fiscal year dated April 1st, 2022, until March 31st, 2023, our program served 53 women and 58 children.

For the future the program has a few things on the go, we are in the process of facilitating a self-care group that will be offered within the community, and in the residential program. We will continue to run community awareness booths, collaborate with other agencies, and work in our best efforts to eliminate family violence. We are striving to continue to promote awareness and take part in preventative activities that provide education to individuals so that family violence and domestic violence can be prevented. We are also actively working with the Alberta Counsel of Women's Shelters and are hoping to be able to connect with more children and youth to deliver programs and awareness.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To: The Board of Directors of

Pincher Creek Women's Emergency Shelter Association

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Pincher Creek Women's Emergency Shelter Association, which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2023, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Pincher Creek Women's Emergency Shelter Association as at March 31, 2023 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Association's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements, continued

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

1. Nature of operations

Pincher Creek Women's Emergency Shelter Association provides safe shelter and support services for women and children in Southwestern Alberta who are fleeing abusive situations. The Association is incorporated under the Societies Act of the Province of Alberta and is exempt from income taxes under the Income Tax Act, section 149(1)(f) as a charitable organization.

2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The significant accounting policies are detailed as follows:

(a) Revenue recognition

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

(b) Cash and cash equivalents

The Association includes cash on hand and cash held by financial institutions in operating, surplus and casino accounts in the determination of cash and cash equivalents.

(c) Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed assets are recorded at their fair value at the date of contribution. The Association provides for amortization using the declining balance method at rates designed to amortize the cost of the capital assets over their estimated useful lives. The annual amortization rates are as follows:

Buildings	4%
Automotive	30%
Furniture and fixtures	20%
Computer equipment	30%

One-half the normal rate of amortization is recorded in the year of acquisition.

(d) Net assets invested in capital assets

Net assets invested in capital assets represents the unamortized portion of capital assets purchased with unrestricted resources, less related debt.

The Association has chosen to continue to treat net assets invested in capital assets as a separate component of net assets.

(e) Financial instruments

The Association initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value. The Association subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

(f) Contributed services

Directors, committee members and owners volunteer their time to assist in the Association's activities. While these services benefit the Association considerably, a reasonable estimate of their amount and fair value cannot be made and, accordingly, these contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

2. Significant accounting policies, continued

(g) Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reported period. Significant areas subject to measurement uncertainty include deferred revenue, amortization of capital assets and amortization of capital contributions. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

3. Restricted cash

Restricted cash relates to funds received from the operation of a casino and prior year surplus requiring government approval. Withdrawal of these funds can only be made for purposes explicitly authorized.

8. Contingency

Full time employees of the Association are allowed to accrue sick leave. As at March 31, 2023 the amount of accumulated sick leave was \$1,888 (2022 - \$2,053). The amount is not recorded in the financial statements as there is no certainty the full amount will be used. The amount of accumulated sick leave is not paid out to employees of the Association when they leave their position.

9. Economic dependence

The Association receives a significant amount of funding from Alberta Human Services. Accordingly, the ability of the Association to meet its future obligations is dependent upon the continued financial support from the Province.

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
